He Karakia o Erama Raihi

E te Ātua,

Tēnā koe mo te oranga o Erama Raihi.

Nāna tōna ngākau ki a Ihu Karaiti i tuku ki ngā tāngata hoki i tāmi mai nei i te rawa kore, i te tuakoka.

Tukua mātou kia whai i tōna tauira o te pono me te mākohakoha.

Homai ki a mātou te kaha rite, te ngākau aroha hoki pēnā i a ia.

I a mātou nei, e rapu ana i te orange o te aroha.

Kei tēnei īnoi mātou e tuku ai ki a Ihu te Karaiti,

Āmene

Above is the Edmund Rice Prayer translated into te reo Maori. As far as I am aware, this is the first time it has been translated in this manner.

A big thank you to the team at St. Thomas of Canterbury College for leading this initiative, and to Mrs Marcelle Leo'o for taking the time to carefully translate the prayer.

This is an exciting moment for the Edmund Rice Network in Aotearoa New Zealand, as we seek to enact Te Tiriti O Waitangi principles.

In particular, translating the Edmund Rice prayer into te reo Maori aligns with the treaty principles of protection and participation by normalising te reo Maori and reflecting the biculturalism of Aotearoa.

However, in order to get the true value from this translation, we must make the effort to learn and incorporate He Karakia o Erama Raihi into our lives, routines and institutions. Stepehen Kennedy's (Director of Religious Studies at St. Thomas College) technique has been to print the prayer off as a business card and put it in the back of his phone!

There are many ways we can nurture the Edmund Rice Prayer and I encourage you to give it a go.
